Learning to Climb Trees Using Rope & Saddle

Introduction

The *Beginning Tree Climbing* course introduces the basic skills necessary to enjoy technical tree climbing while minimizing associated risks.

Instruction includes proper use and care of equipment and introduces the skills necessary to: inspect a tree, enter a tree, maneuver around the canopy, return to the ground. Assessing and understanding the health and condition of a tree is where it all begins as there is no room for error. Students are introduced to technical tree climbing using Moving Rope Systems (MRS) (formerly referred to as Doubled Rope Technique or DdRT).

Course Manual:

All students receive a copy of *Beginning Tree Climbing: Climbing Trees Using Rope & Saddle*. The manual serves as a reference resource of the information covered during the *Beginning Tree Climbing* course as taught by an approved Treetop Explorer, LLC instructor. It also includes tips, pointers, modifications, and additional information not covered during class, which will aid climbers as their climbing skills progress in the years ahead.

Climbing Proficiency:

The material presented and practiced during the *Beginning Tree Climbing* course provides for a level of understanding and confidence when identifying a tree conducive for recreational climbing, setting up a proper MRS climbing system, and maneuvering around the tree from ascent to descent utilizing industry recommended climbing practices to minimize associated risks.

These proficiencies enable climbers to climb trees for general tree entry purposes (such as to hang swings, hammocks, and bat houses, or climb for recreational enjoyment). These skills can be utilized for countless hours of exploration of trees and forests.

Coursework covers:

- Tree health & hazard assessment
- Basic tree entry using throw-ball
- Climbing & working knots
- MRS/DdRT climbing systems
- Climbing techniques (ascent, maneuvering, descent)
- Positioning & minimizing risk
- Equipment selection, function, maintenance, and care
- Ethics, safety standards, safe climbing practices

Completion of the course is not sufficient nor intended to prepare climbers to take others into trees, teach the knots and techniques covered, or perform tree work. Such skills require additional instruction beyond the scope of the *Beginning Tree Climbing* course.
